

From birth through every decade of life, and from one generation to the next, St. Luke's has been caring for our community for nearly 150 years.

FOOTPRINTS INTO THE FUTURE

Every birth is special, but when Dr. Carlton Pearse, St. Luke's Chief of Obstetrics and Gynecology, helped deliver Emily's first baby at St. Luke's in 2013, it was a true celebration of generations. Dr. Pearse was also her mother's obstetrician and, 23 years earlier, had helped welcome Emily into the world at St. Luke's.

With a reputation for providing all the services and amenities of a larger hospital, but with a special level of personalized care, it's not surprising that moms return to St. Luke's for all their babies' births – or that families trust St. Luke's from one generation to the next.

Another reason Emily's family has to celebrate: Baby Henry is the fifth living generation, which includes Great-Great-Grandmother Henrietta (90 years old), Great-Grandmother Eula, Grandmother Khristie, and Mom Emily with Henry at 3 months old.



Nationally recognized heart services

St. Luke's Hospital ranks best in the St. Louis region for overall cardiac services and cardiac surgery, according to a Healthgrades® study. The Robert Paine, MD Heart Institute offers state-of-the-art diagnostic, interventional and surgical cardiac procedures, electrophysiology procedures, heart disease prevention programs and cardiac rehabilitation programs.

New dimension of cancer care

Having just completed a two-year \$6.2 million expansion, the St. Luke's Center for Cancer Care now offers one of the most comprehensive cancer programs in the region. New clinical initiatives include the first STAR™ certified (Survivorship Training and Rehab) Program in the St. Louis area, which focuses on the physical and emotional healing of cancer survivors.

Enhancing maternity services

To better meet the needs of premature babies and newborns with special medical needs, and advancements in neonatal medicine, in 2013 St. Luke's completed an extensive renovation of The Saigh Foundation Special Care Nursery, St. Luke's level II neonatal nursery. The expanded space integrates upgraded technology and state-of-the-art design, including private rooms for families. This year St. Luke's also began a multi-year plan to remodel much of the labor, delivery and post-partum areas, including enhancements to patient rooms, family waiting areas and the on-site Lactation Center.

Advancements in sleep medicine

Through collaborative research projects with Stanford, Harvard and other large research institutions, St. Luke's Sleep Medicine and Research Center contributes to advances in the field of sleep medicine. In 2013, the Center expanded its capabilities with home sleep studies, making sleep testing more convenient for patients, where appropriate. While the Center evaluates and treats patients ages 6 months to 90 years, its pediatric patient volume continues to grow each year.

Number one in neurosurgery and neurosciences

Providing surgical and non-surgical treatment options for various neurological diseases and injuries to the nervous system, the Orthwein Brain and Spine Center at St. Luke's Hospital was the first of its kind in St. Louis. St. Luke's continues to offer the latest in neurological care, ranking number one in Missouri for neurosurgery and neurosciences (neurosurgery and stroke treatment combined), according to a 2013 independent study by Healthgrades®.

Increased demand in orthopedics

As baby boomers age, demand has increased for total joint and orthopedic procedures. St. Luke's Stride to Success pre-operative orthopedic educational class also continues to grow. Working closely with Therapy Services to provide the most complete patient care, our orthopedic surgeons continue to help generations return to an active lifestyle or improve quality of life at any age.

Excellence in women's health

St. Luke's is the only hospital in the St. Louis area to be part of the national Spirit of Women® Health Network. Knowing women often care for multiple generations of the family, including children, grandchildren and parents, the St. Luke's Spirit of Women membership program, which grew to 10,000 members this year, offers health education, community outreach and resources specifically designed to empower women and their families to take action for better health. To help them do that, St. Luke's offers a full range of women's services for care at every stage of life.

Urgent Care continues to expand

Seeing a need for more convenient and prompt minor emergency care serving all ages, more than 30 years ago St. Luke's opened one of the first urgent care centers in the St. Louis area. Today, board-certified physicians, nurse practitioners, registered nurses, and X-ray and lab technicians staff six St. Luke's Urgent Care Centers, with a seventh scheduled to open in Ladue in fall 2013. In another new model of convenience for patients and innovation in care, last year St. Luke's opened its first *Convenient Care* inside the new Dierbergs Des Peres.

Impacting next generation pulmonary care

With the goal of advancing care for the next generation and beyond, St. Luke's pulmonary research center is on the forefront of improving pulmonary medicine. For example, St. Luke's is part of a research study for a new diagnostic test to make treatment of asthma more effective. In another effort, St. Luke's is on the forefront of helping develop a standard to improve diagnosis of pulmonary fibrosis and other traditionally hard-to-diagnose pulmonary conditions.



For Robin, a routine mammogram last year at age 47 led to a breast ultrasound and biopsy. Knowing Robin also had a strong family history of breast cancer (her mother and both grandmothers battled it), Robin's doctor recommended the St. Luke's BreastAdvantage® Risk Assessment Program.

Up to 30 percent of breast cancer is the result of hereditary or genetic factors. BreastAdvantage, offered exclusively at St. Luke's mammography locations, is a free program designed to ensure women at increased risk get the screenings and individualized care they need. The risk assessment includes review of the results by an experienced breast care nurse, a certified genetic counselor and a radiologist specializing in breast imaging.

Robin's daughter, Allie, who at age 23 had already experienced years of breast health issues, also chose to have genetic testing. The results helped Robin and Allie both make the difficult decision to have preventive double mastectomies. Their surgeries at St. Luke's were within one month of each other.

Allie, who recently graduated from college and is planning her wedding, may not be grateful for the genetics she was handed, but she has chosen to focus on what she can control. "I feel blessed that I got to have the surgery – before I got cancer," said Allie.



It was sort of by accident that DeAydra and DeAndria were born at St. Luke's Hospital. At six months pregnant with twin girls, Joy went into labor on Christmas Day while visiting her aunt who worked at St. Luke's. DeAydra and DeAndria were born three months early and spent the first two months of their lives at St. Luke's.

Through the normal wellness and illnesses of childhood, DeAydra and DeAndria were patients at St. Luke's Pediatric Care Center. This year, they will celebrate their 25th birthday, and although they are too old to be patients themselves, they still see the doctors, nurses and other staff at the Center regularly. DeAydra's three children, Daunte, 4, Tori, 2, and 3-month-old Leah, and DeAndria's 2-year-old daughter, Brooklyn, are now the next generation of Pediatric Care Center patients in their family.

Pediatric Care Center ensures access to quality care

When St. Luke's made the decision more than 60 years ago to dedicate a facility to providing preventive healthcare and treatment to medically underserved and underinsured children, it ensured that generations of children would thrive and have access to the quality healthcare they deserved. Continuing that commitment, the St. Luke's Pediatric Care Center located in North St. Louis County offers care for children from birth to age 18, with nearly 6,000 patient visits last year.

Comprehensive services for seniors

Over the past few years, St. Luke's has developed a full complement of services to address the health and wellness needs of older adults.

St. Luke's added *Home Health Services* in 2009 and the program has continued to grow, from 14,000 visits in its first year to nearly 34,000 this year. It offers a full range of nursing, therapy, social work and aide services that enable individuals to recover and stay safe and healthy in their homes.

A year later, St. Luke's added *Hospice Services* to provide comprehensive end-of-life care at any age. The care team includes registered nurses, medical social workers, spiritual care chaplains, grief counselors, aides and a medical director, as well as therapists and dietitians, as needed.

Since 1990, St. Luke's *Surrey Place* has offered assisted living and skilled nursing facility services to the community, as well as residential private rooms, long-term care, Alzheimer's and dementia care, and short-term rehabilitation and therapy.

The most recent addition to St. Luke's senior offerings is *Senior Solutions*, a joint program of St. Luke's Hospital and St. Andrew's Resources to offer care and services to older adults. It provides a wide range of customized services including personal care, transportation, medication management and more, to assist seniors and their caregivers.

Maximizing recovery through rehabilitation

When someone suffers a severe injury or illness, oftentimes their care falls to a family member – one generation caring for another. *St. Luke's Rehabilitation Hospital* provides intensive inpatient rehabilitation programs and services to patients with severe illnesses and injuries with the goal of helping them return to independent living and regain their quality of life.



Children sometimes follow in the career footsteps of their parents. St. Luke's is honored to have a number of dual-generation physician pairs providing care to patients, in some cases even working side-by-side sharing the same medical specialty and office.

Thomas Kim, MD joined the St. Luke's medical staff as an anesthesiologist 24 years ago. This year, his son Patrick Kim, MD, an anesthesiologist, also chose to practice at St. Luke's.

St. Luke's is committed to providing the kind of hospital where generations of physicians choose to work. While they appreciate St. Luke's personalized environment, physicians also elect to work here because St. Luke's shares their desire to offer patients the best medical care within state-of-the-art facilities.

A commitment to recruiting and retaining physicians

For generations, St. Luke's physicians have been providing medical care for the community – from primary care and emergency care to cancer care and neurosurgery, and everything in between. Today, patients have access to more than 1,000 physicians at St. Luke's in over 60 specialty areas. More than 300 of those physicians were named to the *St. Louis Magazine* Best Doctors List, published in August 2013.

St. Luke's continues to expand its medical staff, recruit new physicians, and provide a practice environment that fosters retention of quality medical staff. Last year, 30 new physicians joined St. Luke's medical staff.

To help patients more easily connect with a physician, St. Luke's provides a Physician Referral Service staffed by registered nurses. The service offers referrals to physicians based on a patient's specific preferences and needs, and can assist with appointment scheduling.

Training the next generation

Recognizing the importance of investing in the next generation of physicians, St. Luke's offers an Internal Medicine Residency Program that provides critical training and mentoring for medical school graduates. The program has trained more than 450 residents during the past 35 years and is fully accredited by the Accreditation Council on Graduate Medical Education. Residents gain three years of intensive, real-world experience under the supervision of attending physicians and chief residents. They provide primary care in an urban public health clinic and care for hospitalized patients in the ICU and other units at St. Luke's Hospital.

Residency programs are highly competitive and St. Luke's is no exception. Each year more than 2,800 medical school graduates apply for the 14 available spots.

Implementing electronic medical records

As part of the next generation of patient/provider communication and efforts to enhance patient safety and care, St. Luke's is well into a multi-year plan to implement a comprehensive electronic medical record system. Currently, electronic records are utilized by physicians for all inpatient stays, tests and procedures.

Exceptional employees deliver exceptional care

More than 3,500 employees provide the personalized care and create the family environment for which St. Luke's is known. It's not hard to find multiple members of the same family that work at St. Luke's, including many generations.

St. Luke's is proud to have more than 400 employees with 25 years or more of service. Of those, more than 250 have celebrated 30 years, more than 100 have celebrated 35 years, and more than 10 have achieved 40 years of service. A couple of employees have been with St. Luke's for as long as 45 years.

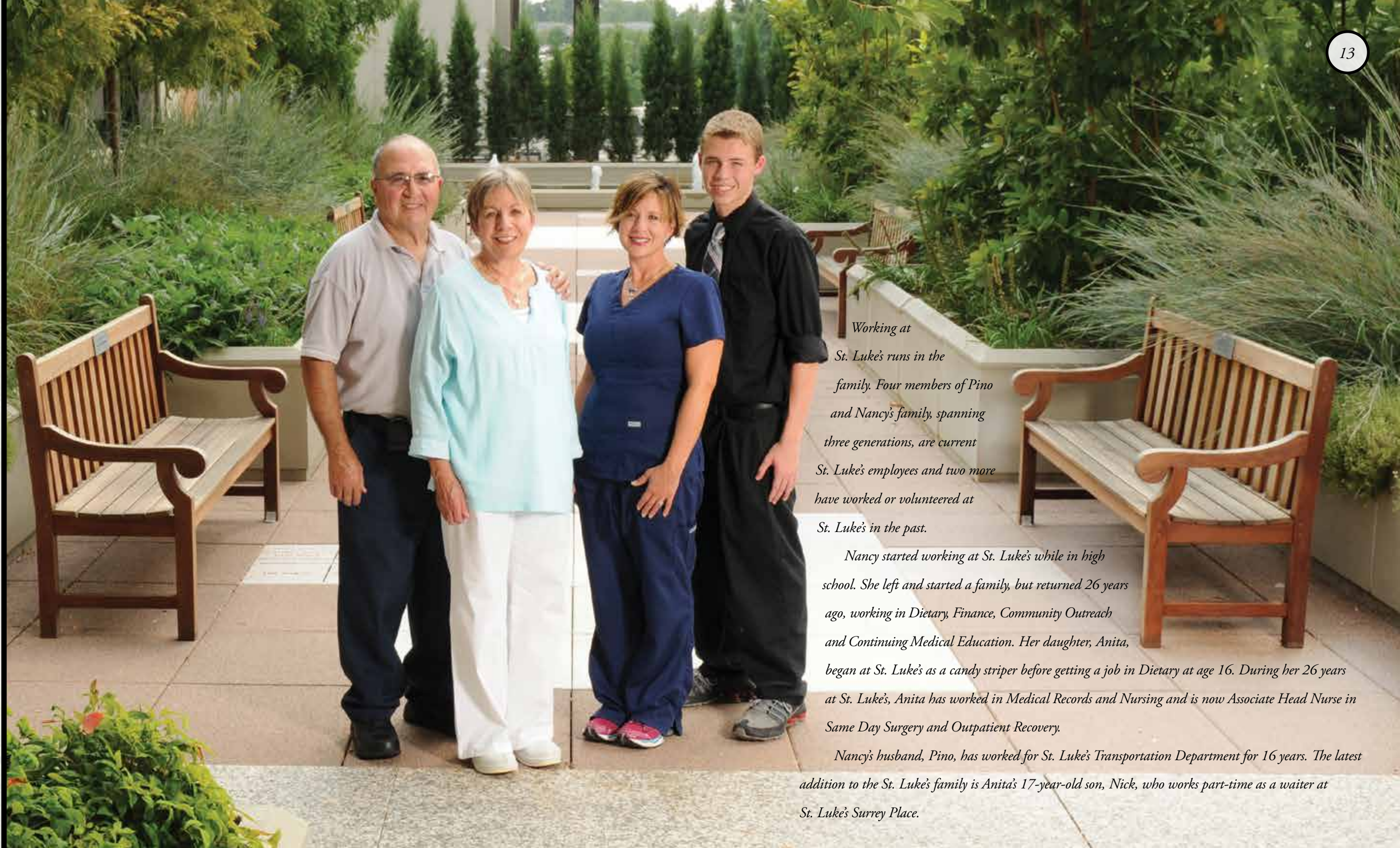
The dedication employees have to St. Luke's also is reflected in the care they provide. St. Luke's consistently reports outstanding patient satisfaction scores.

Volunteers offer invaluable service

Even volunteering at St. Luke's is often a family tradition. Multiple generations within a family serve as volunteers, many employees and physicians have family members who volunteer, and there are 29 sets of married couples who volunteer.

In 2013, more than 400 volunteers collectively provided 84,000 hours to St. Luke's.

The Auxiliary of St. Luke's Hospital, which currently has 218 members, is a major source of support for the hospital through volunteer hours and fundraising efforts. In December 2012, the Auxiliary donated \$150,500 to St. Luke's.



Working at St. Luke's runs in the family. Four members of Pino and Nancy's family, spanning three generations, are current St. Luke's employees and two more have worked or volunteered at St. Luke's in the past.

Nancy started working at St. Luke's while in high school. She left and started a family, but returned 26 years ago, working in Dietary, Finance, Community Outreach and Continuing Medical Education. Her daughter, Anita, began at St. Luke's as a candy striper before getting a job in Dietary at age 16. During her 26 years at St. Luke's, Anita has worked in Medical Records and Nursing and is now Associate Head Nurse in Same Day Surgery and Outpatient Recovery.

Nancy's husband, Pino, has worked for St. Luke's Transportation Department for 16 years. The latest addition to the St. Luke's family is Anita's 17-year-old son, Nick, who works part-time as a waiter at St. Luke's Surrey Place.



Having just graduated from seminary, Chris hadn't yet decided his career path when his mom, a nurse practitioner at St. Luke's, introduced him to St. Luke's Pastoral Care Department Director Renita Heinzl. They made an immediate connection and Chris decided to apply to the St. Luke's Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) residency program. He says it changed his life.

"I learned more in the 15-month program than I learned in my whole life," said Chris. The hands-on experience ministering to patients and families helped him realize that he wanted to assist people through times of recovery, healing and grief. It led him to his current position as an associate pastor at a local church, where he is in charge of pastoral care and hospital visitation.

Chris' mom, Louise, has worked at St. Luke's for 26 years, most recently as a nurse practitioner on the surgical unit.

A ministry of presence

Central to St. Luke's Episcopal-Presbyterian heritage, St. Luke's *Pastoral Care Department* offers a ministry of presence through various services and resources. Chaplains are available around the clock at St. Luke's Hospital, Surrey Place and the Rehabilitation Hospital to provide pastoral care to patients, families, visitors, staff and physicians of all faiths.

St. Luke's also offers an accredited *Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) Program*, providing ministry students of various faith traditions with a valuable learning opportunity to enhance the quality of their ministry and pastoral care. St. Luke's CPE Learning Center offers a 1- and 2-year Residency Program, an 11-week Summer Program, a 16-week Extended Program and a 2- to 3-year Supervisory CPE Program.

Mission in the community

The concept of mission extends far beyond the Pastoral Care Department. The St. Luke's *Mission Outreach Committee*, comprised of employees across the organization, coordinates efforts throughout the year in which employees, patients and physicians generously support such initiatives as:

- Winter clothing drives to help clothe families of the St. Luke's Pediatric Care Center and Isaiah 58 Ministries during the colder months.
- Food drives to benefit Operation Food Search in their work to feed hungry families in our communities.
- School supply drives to provide backpacks and school supplies to children of the Pediatric Care Center.

The hospital also sponsors and participates in numerous charitable events and nonprofit health organizations.

Setting a healthy example

Understanding the important health example hospitals need to set for the community, this year *St. Luke's was the first hospital in Missouri to join the National Hospital Healthy Food Initiative*, part of the Partnership for a Healthy America. With a goal to end the childhood obesity epidemic within a generation, St. Luke's is committed to enhancing on-site food offerings. The multi-phase plan entails offering more nutritious food options for staff, patients and visitors, including lower priced wellness meals, better nutrition labeling and phasing out fried foods over the next few years.

A culture of giving

Generations of care, leadership and philanthropy

The bright future of St. Luke's Hospital is built on the vision to grow more extraordinary healthcare programs and services for patients and their families. Philanthropic support enables St. Luke's to expand and enhance its services and facilities, such as the newly renovated Saigh Foundation Special Care Nursery and the St. Luke's Center for Cancer Care.

Charitable gifts to the Friends of St. Luke's annual fund and from grateful patients provide significant financial support to St. Luke's Hospital, greatly assisting and ensuring its sustainability.

Total Charitable Giving

In fiscal year 2013 (July 1, 2012 – June 30, 2013), St. Luke's received over \$3.3 million in philanthropic giving. This includes more than \$1.5 million in unrestricted giving from individual donors, corporations and estates.

Friends of St. Luke's

The Friends of St. Luke's are families, physicians, community members and business leaders who promote philanthropic support to enhance the mission and strategic vision of St. Luke's Hospital for the health of the community.

The Friends of St. Luke's contributed \$639,660 this year through the generous gifts of more than 400 donors, surpassing their \$575,000 goal. The leadership, commitment and involvement of the Friends of St. Luke's set a wonderful example in the community and reinforce St. Luke's dedication to medical excellence.

Young Friends of St. Luke's

The Young Friends of St. Luke's is a dynamic group of young professionals, volunteers and physicians dedicated to:

- Promoting a healthy lifestyle in the community.
- Providing social and business networking opportunities.

Recently formed in 2012, The Young Friends hosted a number of fundraising events and participated in community health programs this year.



When Cindy was selected President of the Friends of St. Luke's this year, it only strengthened her family's multi-generational connection to St. Luke's – through leadership, volunteer and philanthropic support and as patients.

Cindy's mother, Ann, has volunteered at the hospital and her father, James A. Maritz, Jr. (deceased), served as President of the St. Luke's Hospital Board of Directors from 1974 through 1976. "I remember some of his happiest memories were working with St. Luke's," says Cindy of her father. "He instilled in us the value of working hard for an organization that you believe in."

Cindy's sister-in-law, Michele, is actively involved on the St. Luke's Gala Committee, volunteering significant time and creative energy to make the St. Luke's Office of Development's fundraising gala a success.

Operating results

St. Luke's operating revenue in excess of expense for the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2013 was \$16,948,000, representing an operating margin of 3.7 percent. Based on the hospital activity shown above, total operating revenue grew to \$458 million, a 5 percent increase over the prior fiscal year.

Community benefit

As a nonprofit organization, St. Luke's Hospital is committed to its mission of improving the health of the community. In fiscal year 2013, St. Luke's provided unreimbursed services costing \$11 million in the form of charity and Medicaid discounts to uninsured and underinsured patients, helping individuals in our community access medical care regardless of their ability to pay.



St. Luke's regularly invests in its facilities, upgrading and renovating to accommodate new technologies and provide care to patients in state-of-the-art spaces. The nonprofit hospital is located just off Highway 40/I-64 at Highway 141 in Chesterfield, but St. Luke's services are accessed through more than 20 locations from Midtown to St. Charles County and North County to South County.

Over the past few years, St. Luke's has expanded its presence in growing St. Charles County to meet the community's needs, including primary and specialty care services, imaging, therapy, nutrition counseling and pharmacy services, as well as an Urgent Care Center and Sleep Medicine Center. St. Luke's newest facility will open this fall – an Urgent Care Center in Ladue.

Addressing community health needs

The St. Luke's vision truly reflects our commitment to community outreach: St. Luke's will be a premier regional healthcare provider serving St. Louis Metro, portions of Eastern Missouri and Southwestern Illinois. We will actively reach out to the public, physicians, employees, referring providers and the communities we serve, offering a wider range of health services than a traditional hospital.

St. Luke's Hospital has a strong commitment to the health of the community. Beyond delivering inpatient and outpatient care, St. Luke's has an *active community outreach offering* that provides thousands of educational and preventive health opportunities, including health screenings, special events, classes and support groups, each year to our community. Additionally, St. Luke's partners with nearly 200 employers across the area to bring health education and screenings to worksites as part of its extensive *worksites wellness program*.

As part of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, all nonprofit hospitals are conducting *Community Health Needs Assessments* to evaluate the community needs and ensure they are offering programming and services to meet these needs. St. Luke's embarked on an 18-month process to identify and assess the full scope of needs of the West St. Louis County (West County) population through input solicited from area health experts and community leaders, and selected primary and secondary survey sources of input to identify target areas for improvement.

With this information, St. Luke's is developing an implementation plan with ways to enhance our education and partner with community organizations to improve the quality of life in our community, specifically in the areas of:

- Obesity and Sedentary Lifestyle
- Cancer Screenings and Support Services
- Management of Chronic Conditions

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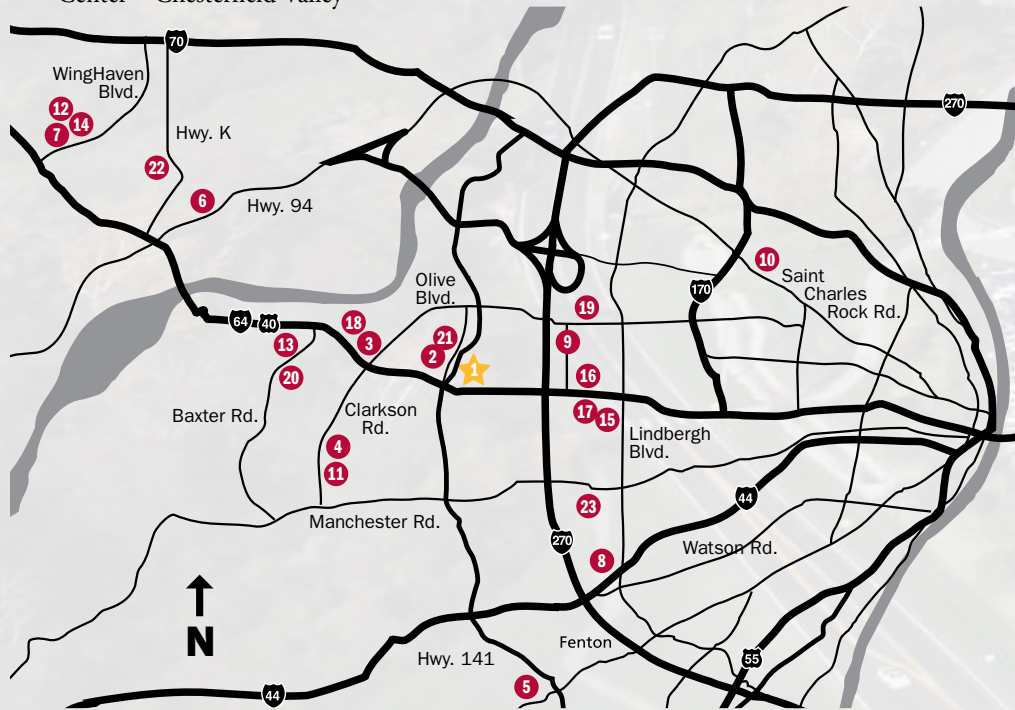
